

Theatre in our Schools Month Outstanding Impact Award 2026

Thank you for participating in Theatre in Our Schools Month (TiOS)! In order to receive the TIOS Outstanding Impact Award, a school must coordinate activities to advocate for the importance of theatre in our schools in the two categories detailed below. The award is open to any K-12 theatre program.

In Your Classroom

Goal	Educators integrate advocacy-focused lesson plans found on the EdTA Learning Center to promote student voice and advocacy in the classroom.
Skills Demonstrated	Teacher and students engage in reflective practice focused on advocacy goals in the lesson. Includes strong artifacts (photos, student writing, performance clips, testimonials, etc.) demonstrating learning. Assessment clearly measures understanding of advocacy.
Evidence	Submit 3-4 images with captions that reflect on and explain the student engagement and/or a 2-3 minute video of students creating work that emerge from the lesson plan. Additionally, submit student reflections, lesson artifacts, and assessments.
Evaluation	10 points reviewed based on student engagement and evidence of meaningful dialogue through the use of the TIOS Lesson Plan most applicable to the grade(s) you teach.



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In Your School

Goal	Students and educators engage in local advocacy focused on student voice and advocacy for theatre education at the local level using the Local Advocacy Guidebook.
Skills Demonstrated	Advocacy efforts include multiple high-quality activities (presentations, displays, student-led events, admin outreach, public messaging, etc.). Activities show strong planning, creativity, and clear impact. Advocacy goals are clearly articulated, intentional, and aligned with TIOS Month's mission of promoting access to quality theatre education.
Evidence	Submit 3-4 images with captions that explain the student engagement and/or a 2-3 minute video of student advocacy at local level that emerge from the EdTA Local Advocacy Guidebook. Additionally, submit any student reflections and engagement artifacts.
Evaluation	10 points reviewed based on student leadership, engagement at the local level, and advocacy for theatre education.
